We took a day out sight-seeing the other week and enjoyed some magnificent scenery and beautiful waterfalls. Plenty of walking and bought a couple of items for our home too: traditionally African carved wooden fruit bowl and bookends.

One Thursday in late June I had a very moving visit to the Barberton Correctional Centre, a High security prison with hundreds of men crowded into cramped Victorian type accommodation. The occasion was the graduation service for 40 'students' who had completed our Basic Discipleship Course. I spoke about the importance of God's Word and how Jesus has brought a powerful change to so many lives here in 2018. Men with life sentences testified about how they were wonderfully forgiven and 'free' on the inside, and it showed on their faces! Each student was presented with a gift-bag containing toothpaste and a toothbrush, soap, a packet of crisps, deodorant and a chocolate bar. Some of the Christian inmates provided the exuberant music for the service – I think it could be heard 100kms away but I got to 'enjoy' it from about 5 metres away! Sorry, no cameras or phones were allowed in.

Last month we visited Calvary AoG
Assembly, Nelspruit, a church founded
by the Newingtons. Their longstanding senior pastor is praying for a
successor. After I preached they
spontaneously took up a generous
offering for The Press. They've enjoyed
an interesting history, not least with their
premises: They were gifted a large piece of

land by the government for their small Christian school. After years of waiting and praying, they were remarkably blessed by the local Dutch Reformed Church building them a beautiful new building, in exchange for their smaller older premises! Faith and patience = provision!

After weeks of deliberating we feel God has joined our hearts to the small group of believers at Calvary Church here in White River. The leadership team recently bid farewell to the couple who had been invited to pastor the church 3 years ago, so now they are seeking God's will for the future. It's been a difficult season as they have suffered loss and uncertainty over recent months. I preached there recently and will do so again in August just before we take our 7 week U.K. break.
