Hot off The Press in South Africa




I'm happy to write of good news as we mark six months of our current chapter in White River. Yes, life continues apace with the unexpected becoming usual; not quite mundane, but we're never bored or too fussy about planning the details of living.

In February we welcomed friends Len and Zelna Weyers from Pretoria and Thursday evening slipped all too fast

into Monday morning when we bade them farewell. We took an excursion into Kruger National Park (KNP) but sightings were not memorable. It's funny how you can get used to having to slow down and wait while a family of elephants lumber slowly across the road... I really can't imagine that closer to home.

I was blessed to meet a couple with whom I immediately clicked. We agreed to meet again in April once they return from a home-visit to USA. They lead a Christian mission, SINANI, working with youth and orphans, and would love to use our Bible study courses. Also in February we were visited by our dear friend Domingos from Mozambique - I plan to visit his home and preach in his church at about the time you'll receive this letter.

We were delighted to attend an unusual party - a 39th birthday party for a friend who had never celebrated his birthday before. So, despite his embarrassment and awkwardness, we blessed him and showered him with 'family' love. We entertained another couple for a happy meal which challenged Kay's cuisine with no dairy, gluten or meat.

I had a new experience, speaking at the Nelspruit Christian School assembly and centred my talk around The Big Five. I challenged the students (6-18yrs old) to be BRELLiant. BRELL = The Big Five – do you know them? To be a BRELL person, you'll love the Bible, Read it, Eat it, Learn it, Live it. It seemed to find its mark.

I met with a few church leaders, introducing the concept of working with them in outreach, using our courses in God's written Word. The office has also been busy; good sales of Bibles and a flow of people bringing lessons for marking and renewing. In the Nelspruit church we have enjoyed a midweek meeting to seek the Lord; just a small number gathering, but a precious group longing to see something fresh and new in their church life.

We were very tired but so blessed and grateful to have shared the best news in the world with dear friends who have so little in this passing world.
